

As many of you know Gareth Thomas had been ill since November but, most galling of all, we were hopeful at December's Christmas party that Gareth was on the road to recovery. However, things made a very rapid turn for the worst and in the evening of Saturday 4th February, Gareth passed away.

Anyone who didn't know Gareth too well will have already heard lots of members talking about Gareth's commitment to the club; he was an ever-present at club meetings and shows, giving other members lifts and even serving on the committee on at least two occasions over a period of over 20 years.

Gareth was a former RAF serviceman with over 17 years of service and, like anyone who served in the military, Gareth always had a new story about how dumb, disorganised and generally lacking in common sense the RAF was, and yet in the same breath would tell you how proud he was of his time

Gareth's passing had an extra person hit for me; there has been a long-standing joke in the club, that Gareth himself happily joined in with, that he built very few kits, and last year, he and I had a little bet; I bet him £5 that he wouldn't have a kit built by Scale Model World. Gareth happily took the bet, and then ambitiously started working on a 1/32 scale Hawker Hunter. And up until around September, when his health started to really decline, I genuinely believed he was going to win our little bet. And to be honest, I was quite keen to see the result as Gareth was very knowledgeable when it came to the hobby.

Obviously, he didn't manage to finish it, but it was obvious he had been unwell for a while before hand, but when we'd last spoke about it, he said he was nearly to the point of only needing to fit the decals.

In December when he said he was starting to feel better, I said to him that I was looking forward to seeing the finished article, and he seemed enthusiastic about finishing it and I joked that the entire club would be shocked and excited to see a finished kit from him.

EAGER BEAVER	JAN-OCT	Any modelling subject. One yearly winner - most points acquired over the year.
THEME	JAN-OCT	2023 theme is "MYTHOLOGY" Any model which reflects this theme is eligible. All points gained are also counted for the Eager Beaver Trophy, all entries qualify for T.A.Trophy.
BRANCH CHAMPIONSHIP	DEC	All monthly winners plus Charity Trophy winners return at December (party) meeting. Winner voted by club members.
RON ROWLEY	DEC	Trophy for the member gaining the most certificates as overall monthly competition winner. (Theme & Eager Beaver combined).
BILL NICHOLLS CHARITY TROPHY	DEC-MAR	Donated kits are drawn at random at Dec. meeting. A payment of £5 per kit is levied. Kits should be built and displayed at the April meeting. All proceeds to charity.
HUDSON*	JAN-OCT	Awarded for any conversion - it is not enough to apply different decals and/or colour schemes - winner is the highest scoring conversion of the year. Super-detailing is NOT conversion. <i>Entrants must give details of modifications.</i>
BEST ALL- ROUNDER*	JAN-OCT	Members submit models in at least 4 of the 7 categories (Figures, Military Vehicles, Civil Vehicles, Dioramas, Aircraft, Sci-Fi & Ships). Subjects that have been entered in Eager Beaver are eligible, as this is a "one-off" competition.
JAGUAR*	JAN-OCT	Any subject which can, in any way, be associated with the word Jaguar. <i>Entrants must clarify the link if it is not obvious.</i>
BUSTS, FIGURES & FLATS*	JAN-OCT	Specifically for those who like to model figures in 2D or 3D.

IVOR DOWE	JAN-OCT	Any diorama in any theme
SCI-FI & FANTASY	JAN-OCT	Any models that link to a science fiction or fantasy theme or setting.
THREE OF A KIND*		Three models on a linked, e.g. 3 variants of the same tank, aircraft, etc. 3 models depicting the evolution of a type - e.g. Mig 15, Mig 17, Mig 19. There must be a strong, well-defined link. All 3 must be entered at same time.
RON ADAMS MEMORIAL*	JAN-OCT	Any ship, vessel, etc whose working environment is on/in/under water
BEST RUSSIAN AIRCRAFT*	JAN-OCT	Any aircraft designed in Russia/USSR, whatever the markings. Alternatively any aircraft of any origin in authentic Russian/Soviet markings
TRANS-ATLANTIC	NOV	A joint effort with Syracuse Branch. Alternate years one branch nominates a theme. Each Branch judges their own models and photos of the other branch's models, they then declare a UK and a US winner.
BEER MATT CHALLENGE	NOV	A mini-diorama set on a base 110mm x 110mm. The diorama must not overlap the edge of the 'matt' and a max of 4 lengths high.

The above table outlines the list of competitions on offer throughout the club year. Following discussions held at the AGM in November 2018 the competitions marked (*) are under review because of poor take-up in previous years; if the trend continues these competitions could be revised or even scrapped.

A Trophy will only be awarded if there is more than one entry in the relevant competition. In the **10 months Jan to Oct**

A section of the competition table can be set aside for members who wish to display models (complete or part built) but do not wish to enter them in competition.

Aoshima 1:700 S-Class Destroyer – Freebie!

History & Build Report




You'll recall in December, when I absolutely blasted Combrig's 1:700 HMS Lynx kit, I highlighted this kit as one of the reasons for my utter hatred of that kit.

And that is because for the same price as that tiny little kit, I could buy this. And the reason for it is not because of the HMS Cornwall kit that helps Aoshima's weird (But loveable) obsession with the County Class, but for the free S-Class destroyer kit that Aoshima include, which is a WWI-era class that served into WWII, so can be compared to that Combrig kit.

This kit is not sold separately but has its own sprue, instructions sheet and even decal sheet, so it *should* be a whole kit unto itself, especially as these rarer WWI-er destroyers whose main career was in the "forgotten" inter-war period of the 1920's.

The kit itself is not the most detailed but is good enough to be satisfying. The kit goes together nicely, there's no major misalignments. There's even a bunch of options to allow you to build any ship of the class and the decals are just a sheet of numbers for the same reason.





So the question is; why on Earth did Aoshima develop what appears to be a whole kit to just put in the box of a different kit as a free-extra? And what is the connection of the S-Class to HMS Cornwall.



THE PAGODA

Well I can answer the second question. You see HMS Devonshire and Cornwall were both sunk by Japanese forces during the Indian Ocean Raid, know as the Battle of Ceylon, which is what I think the box description is referencing.

There were in fact, four S-Class destroyers stationed in and around the Indian Ocean; HMS Thanet, Thracian, Tenedos and Scout.

Tenedos was sunk by Japanese bombs, Thracian was captured by the Japanese and even survived WWII to be scrapped in 1946. HMS Scout and Thanet continued to be based in Singapore after escaping Hong Kong. HMS Scout was very active in the region but it was HMS Thanet I went for, which I'll come to.

As for the build. The masts and guns are quite chunky, but I can forgive Aoshima this as it's obviously to make the kit robust and there is some fairly nice detailing on the hull deck. With a few bits of photo etch railing and it's a lovely little kit and as I claimed in December, I think this wouldn't look to displeasing next to the Combrig kit. And it was free!!

Or put it another way: I'm kind of sad that this kit is relegated to being a freebie, because there are worse kits that are sold as kits in their own right. I suspect Aoshima either can't be bothered to make it a kit unto itself, or don't think it will sell profitably.

HMS Thanet (H29) - History





As I mentioned above, HMS Thanet is one of the ships I think Aoshima had in mind when they threw the kit in with HMS Cornwall.

Thanet was laid down in December 1917 and launched on the 5th November 1918, only commissioning into the Royal Navy in August 1919. Her most notable inter-war action was to test flying off platforms as the Royal Navy experimented with sea-borne air-power.

She and her three sisters, Thracian, Tenedos and Scout, were all based in Hong Kong and Singapore when the Pacific War began.



Thracian remained in Hong Kong to allow her sisters to escape and as a result would be captured at the fall of Hong Kong. Tenedos was damaged by bombs and later sunk in Columbo harbour and Scout managed to escape Japanese attention.

HMS Thanet would remain in Singapore along with HMAS Vampire until 26th of January 1942

A RAAF Hudson had spotted an expected Japanese landing force to force the capture of Endau that morning, and despite an entire day of bombings, torpedo attacks and dogfights, the Japanese force was undamaged.

With little other option, Rear-Admiral Ernest Spooner deployed HMAS Vampire and HMS




Thanet, the only combat-capable ships he had available to make a night attack on the transports and escorts.

The Japanese force far outnumbered the WWI-era destroyers, consisting of the light-cruiser Sendai and six modern Fubuki-class destroyers. But the two destroyers sailed in the early evening with Vampire in the lead.

The Japanese were on alert, with their intelligence suggesting two light-cruisers were in the area. This was actually a misidentification of Thanet and Vampire.

The two ships managed to skillfully evade the Japanese patrols, even making a unsuccessful torpedo attack against a sub-chaser which wisely did not try to return fire, and with the Japanese transports their main target, the two ships left the Japanese ship.



At 03:18, the destroyer Shirayuki was sighted. Despite firing all five remaining torpedoes (four from Thanet and 1 from vampire) none hit and a significant gun fight ensued, with the cruiser Sendai also opening fire.

For nearly an hour, the Allied ships fought the much larger Shirayuki and cruiser until at 04:00 Thanet would be disabled by a lucky hit that severed all of her steam lines, causing her to lose all engine and electrical power. Vampire laid a smoke screen in an attempt to cover Thanet, but she was already listing heavily and completely disabled. Japanese searchlights had managed to keep Thanet silhouetted and under fire, preventing Vampire from rescuing any of Thanet's crew, who were already in the process of abandoning ship.

None the less, Japanese reports suggested Vampire's action caused a degree of chaos, with friendly-fire incidents occurring among the Japanese and one destroyer accidently beaching.

Shirayuki would suffer an electrical failure after her main circuit breakers tripped and by the time she restored power Vampire had moved out of range and would escape. The cruiser Sendai and four of the Japanese destroyers would descend on the helpless Thanet while one destroyer attempted to pursue Vampire, but would lose sight of her in the darkness.

Despite the two Allied destroyers being totally out massed and outgunned, the Japanese recording 469 round fired in total, with Vampire surviving to return to Singapore later that morning.

Of the 90-strong compliment, around 50 would manage to return to Singapore having evaded Japanese patrols, picking up downed airmen as they went, before being picked up be



a friendly vessel, reaching Singapore on 29th of January 1942. Twelve of Thanet's sailors were killed in the action and 31 were captured.

In another act of Imperial Japanese brutality, 30 are believed to have been executed by the Japanese Army after a defeat at Gemas Bridge.

The object of these articles is to illustrate some (**not exhaustive**) concepts and show modelling potentials available to you, some might be controversial, but what the hell!!

Part Three

"MERLIN"

Merlin (Welsh: Myrddin, Cornish: Marzhin, Breton: Merzhin) is a mythical figure prominently featured in the legend of King Arthur and best known as a mage, (a an **enchanter** enchantress, magic-user, magician, also known as sorcerer/sorceress, spell-caster, warlock, witch, or wizard, is someone who uses or practices magic derived from supernatural, occult, or arcane sources.) among his various other roles. His usual depiction, based on an amalgamation of historic and legendary figures, was introduced by the 12th-century British author Geoffrey of Monmouth. It is believed that Geoffrey combined earlier tales of Myrddin and Ambrosius, two legendary Briton prophets with no connection to Arthur, to form the composite figure called **Merlinus Ambrosius** (Welsh: *Myrddin Emrys*, Breton: *Merzhin Ambroaz*).

AgustaWestland AW101 'MERLIN' is a medium-lift helicopter in military and civil use. First flown in 1987, it was developed by a joint venture between Westland Helicopters in the United Kingdom and Agusta in Italy in response to national requirements for a modern naval utility helicopter. Several operators, including the armed forces of Britain, Denmark, and Portugal, use the name Merlin for their AW101 aircraft. It is manufactured at factories in Yeovil, England, and Vergiate, Italy. Licensed assembly work has also taken place in Japan and the United States.









The **Rolls-Royce Merlin** is a British liquid-cooled V-12 piston aero engine of 27-litres (1,650 cu in) capacity. Rolls-Royce designed the engine and first ran it in 1933 as a private venture. Initially known as the **PV-12**, it was later called *Merlin* following the company convention of naming its four-stroke piston aero engines after birds of prey (which came first the Arthurian Myth or the birds name)?

After several modifications, the first production variants of the PV-12 were completed in 1936. The first operational aircraft to enter service using the Merlin were the Fairey Battle, Hawker Hurricane and Supermarine Spitfire.





The Merlin remains most closely associated with the Spitfire and Hurricane, although the majority of the production run was for the four-engined Avro Lancaster heavy bomber. Starting at 1,000 hp for the first production models, most late war versions produced just under 1,800 hp, and the very latest version as used in the de Havilland Hornet over 2,000 hp.





Applications: the first operational aircraft powered by the Merlin to enter service were the Fairey Battle, Hawker Hurricane, and Supermarine Spitfire. Although the engine is most closely associated with the Spitfire, the four-engined Avro Lancaster was the most numerous application, followed by the twin-engined de Havilland Mosquito.

A Spanish-built version of the Messerschmitt Bf 109 G-2, the 1954 Hispano Aviación HA-1112-M1L Buchon, was built in Hispano's factory in Seville with the Rolls-Royce Merlin 500/45 engine of 1,600 horsepower (1,200 kW) – a fitting powerplant for the last-produced version of the famous Messerschmitt fighter.

The CASA 2.111 was another Spanish-built version of a German aircraft, the Heinkel He 111, that was adapted to use the Merlin after the supply of Junkers Jumo 211F-2 engines ran out at the end of the war. A similar situation existed with the Fiat G.59 when available stocks of the Italian licence-built version of the Daimler-Benz DB 605 engine ran short.
